- Point-in-Time Count

- One night
- Snapshot



- System Performance Measures

- 12 month period
- Outcomes
- Reflects data in Homeless Database

Point-in-Time count: annual “census” of people experiencing homelessness

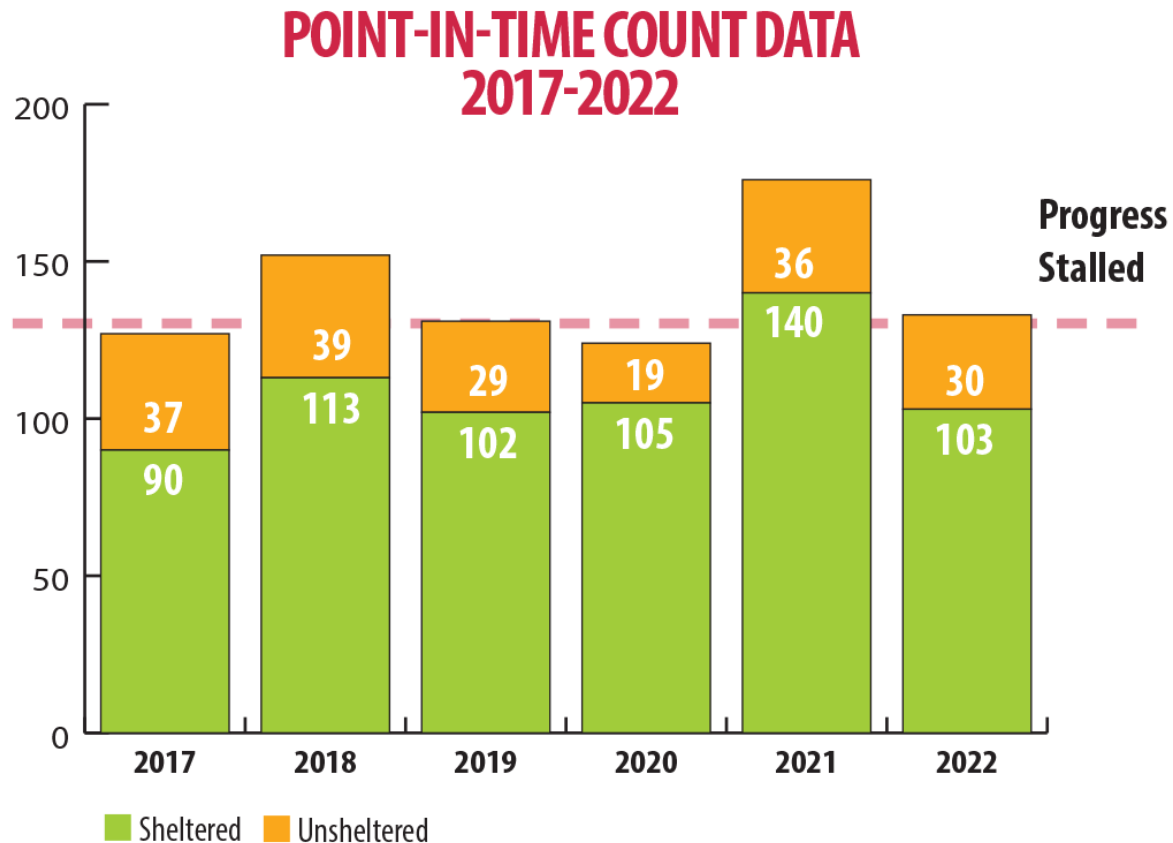
PROs

- Longstanding
- Nationwide
- Accurate for one night

CONs

- Does NOT count everyone in housing crisis
- Affected by weather
- One of several important outcomes

Orange County Point-in-Time (PIT) count: No overall decrease over time



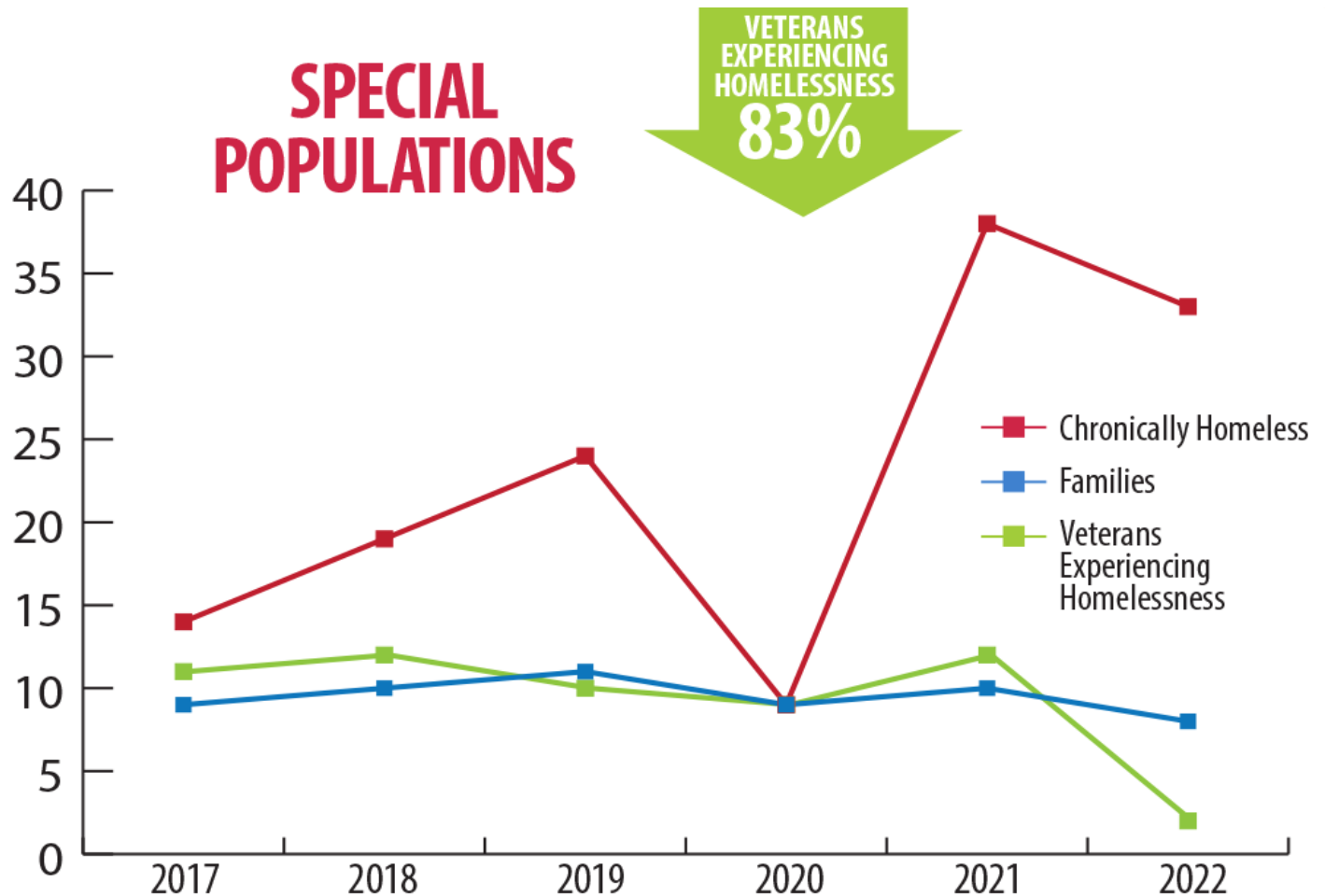
COVID impacts continue to be felt

- Includes two hoteling programs – Cold Weather expansion and COVID isolation
- IFC Shelter in Outbreak Status and unable to conduct new intakes

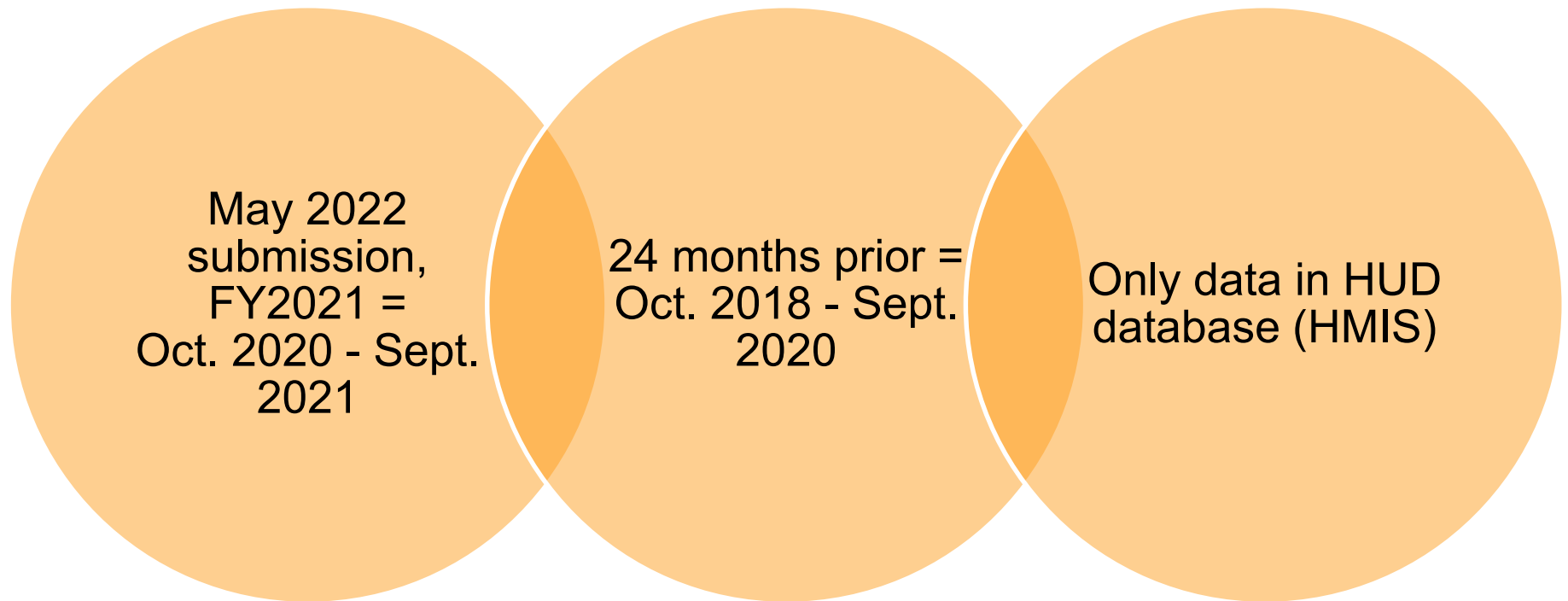


Subpopulations are seeing different outcomes

- Significant reduction in Veteran homelessness
- Change in Family measure

PIT counted 133 people on one night, how many in 12 months?



- % total that experienced homelessness for the first time

2017	2018	2019	2020	2021	2022
85%	72%	63%	75%	79%	75%

- Shelter, Transitional Housing, & Permanent Housing
- Homeless for first time = no entries for 24 months prior

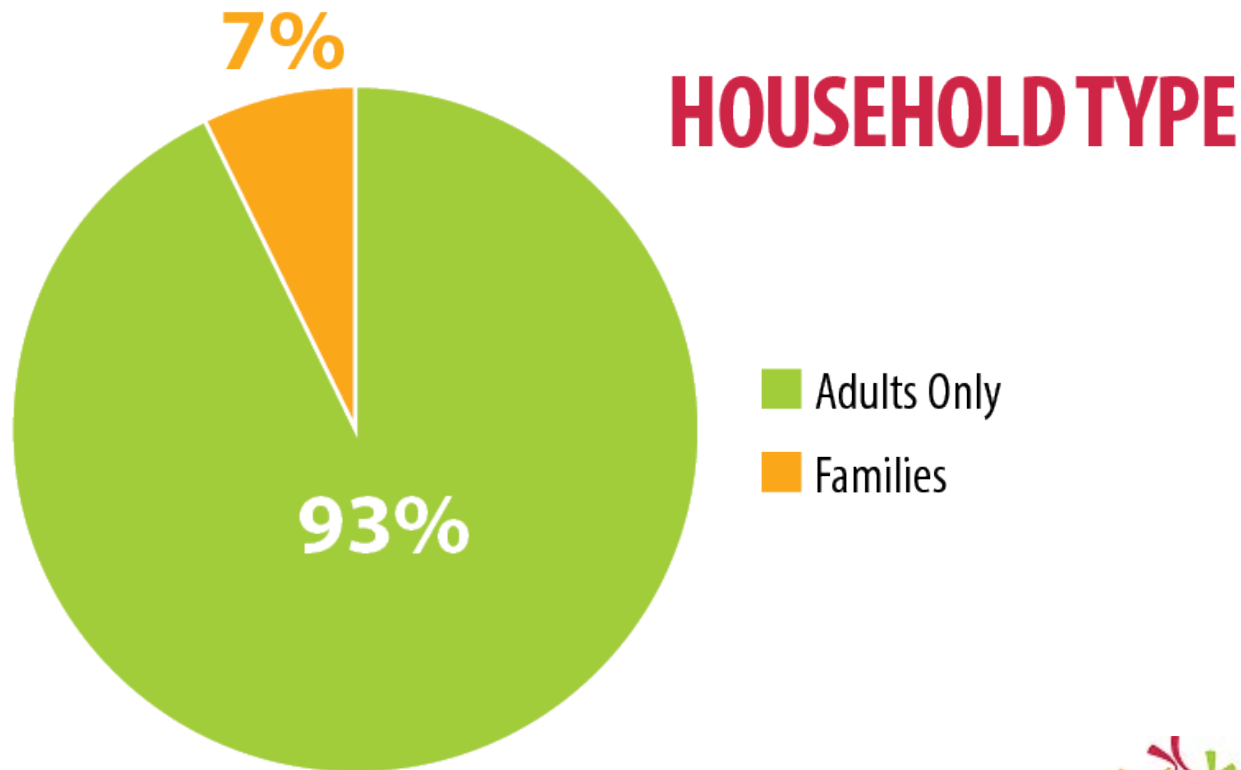
Why are we seeing?



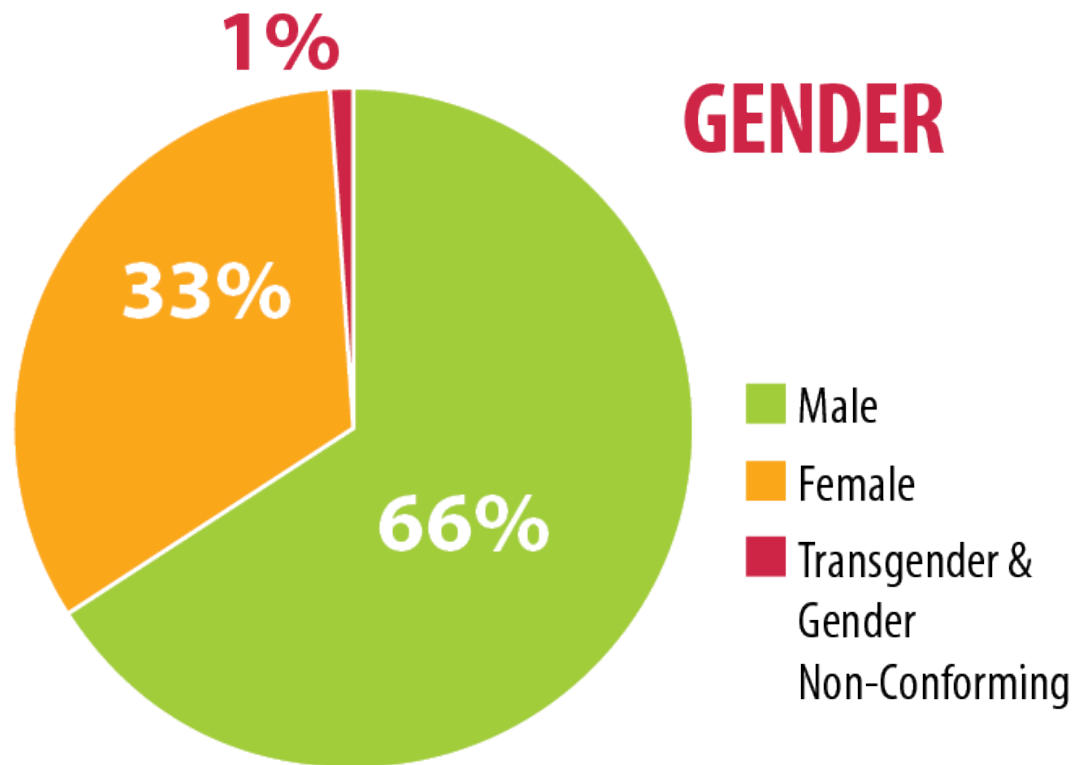
- Increase in people experiencing 1st time homelessness
- No significant reductions in people experiencing chronic homelessness
- Progress housing families flatline

What do we know about people experiencing homelessness?

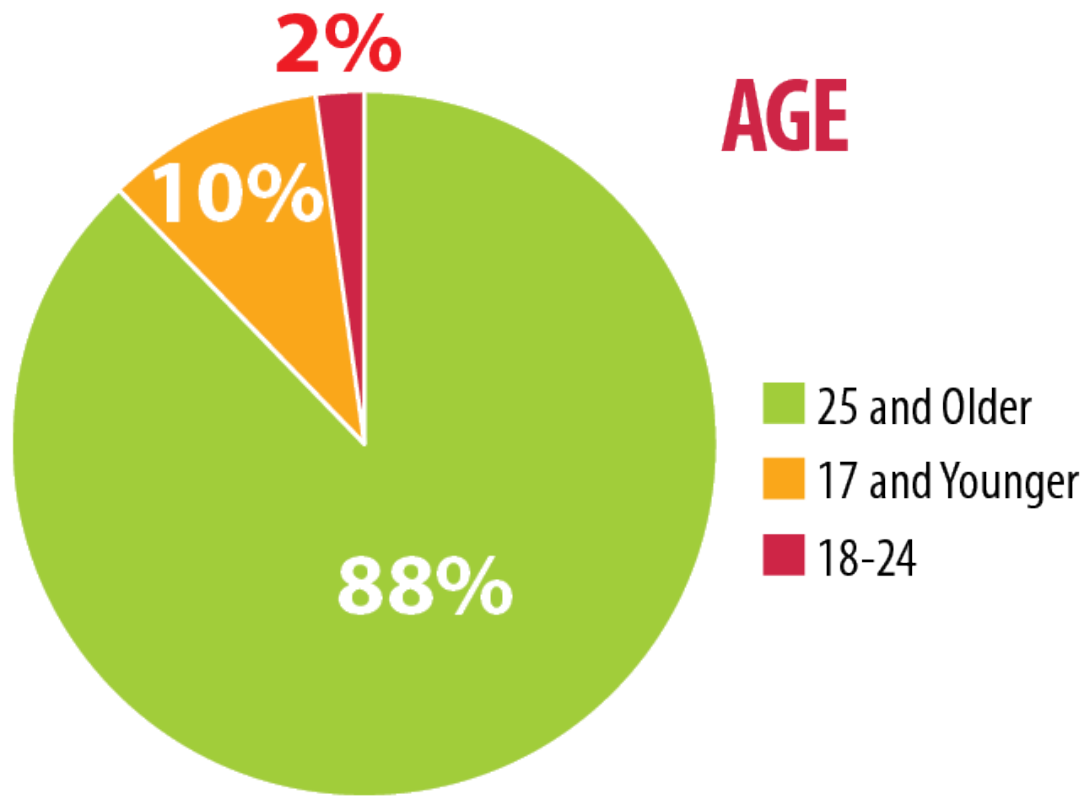
Most people experiencing homelessness in Orange County in adults only households



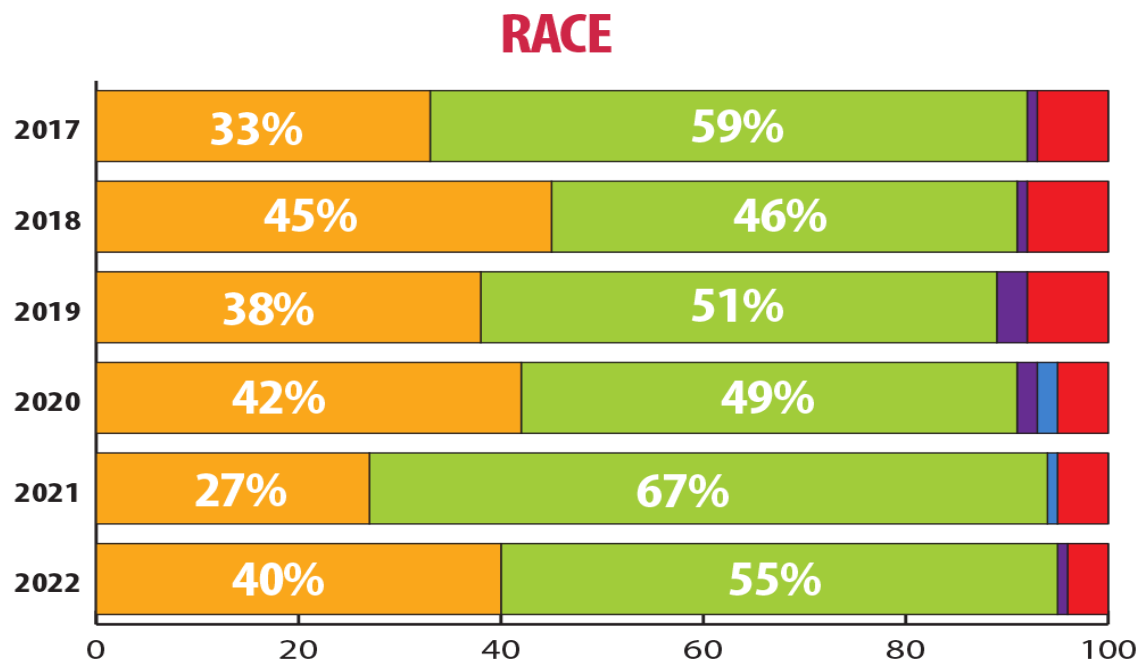
Most people experiencing homelessness in Orange County identify as male



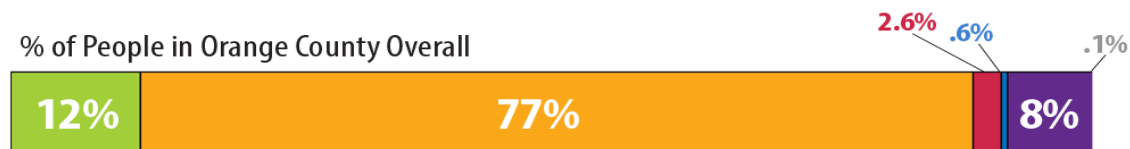
Most people experiencing homelessness in Orange County are 25 and older



Racial disparity continues

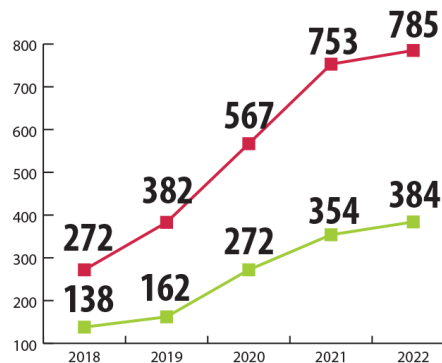

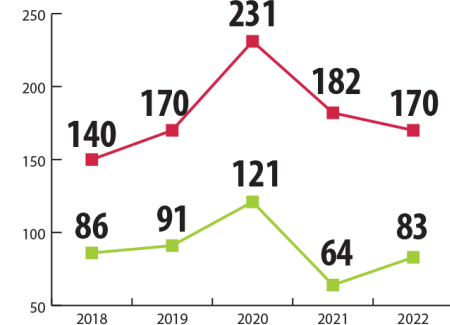

Length of time homeless (days)



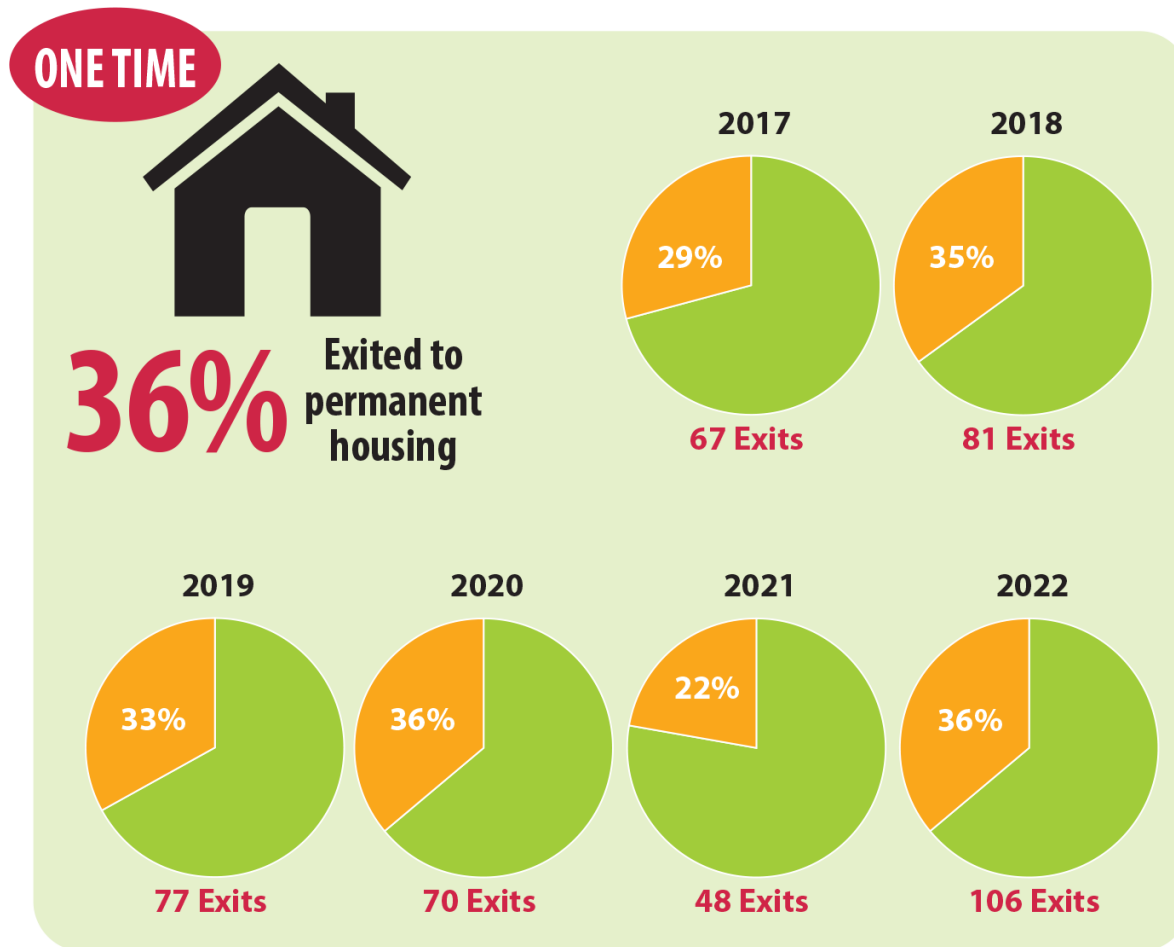

Length of time in shelter or transitional housing (days)

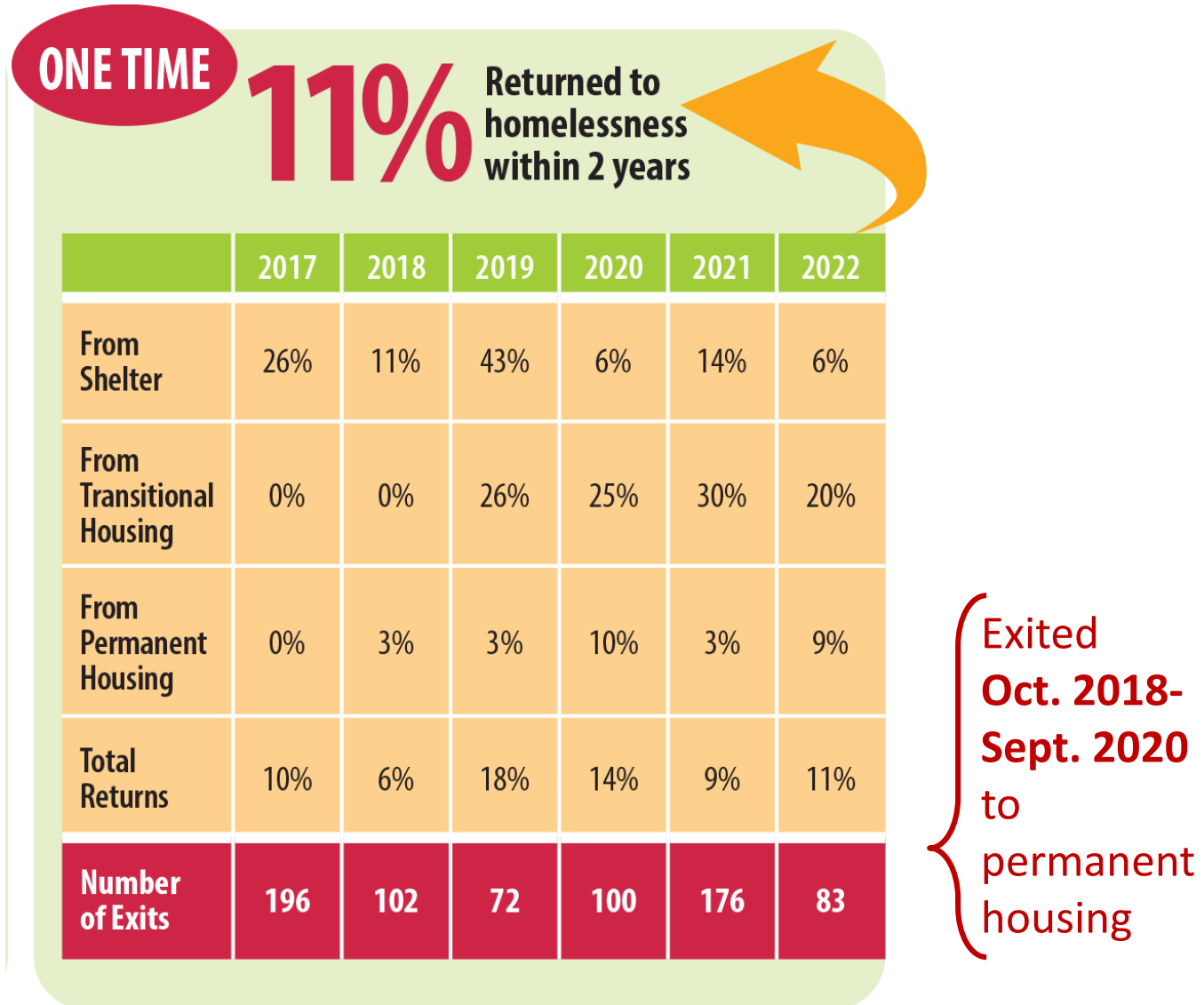


- Shelter, Transitional Housing, & Permanent Housing
- Includes approximate date of homelessness
- Shelter & Transitional Housing only
- Program entry to exit

Goal: People exit to permanent housing



Goal: people do not return to homelessness



Thoughts on how people are leaving our system?



- Length of time homeless large and increasing
- Total number and percentage of exits to permanent housing had a big increase
- Returns continue to be low

Next up: filling homeless system gaps

Pandemic impacts continue with some bright spots!

- Rise in positive exits to Permanent Housing
- Decreases in Veterans experiencing homelessness
- Expansions to Prevention and Rapid Re-housing
- Continued collaboration across the System

Pandemic requires constant shifting

- Orange County has the highest vaccination rates across Peers yet...
- Congregate living has its challenges
- Gaps exacerbate bottlenecks in program flow
- Rents continue to rise

Orange County has significant gaps in the homeless service system

- 15 current gaps
 - Income based rental units, Rapid Re-housing, Permanent Supportive Housing, Household goods, Youth housing, Landlord Incentives, Housing Locator
 - Services: Crisis/Diversion facility, Integrated service center, Accessible housing-focused shelter, Housing Help staffing, Memorial service funding, 24-hour bathroom access, medical respite, bridge housing

What connections do you see between system gaps and increasing homelessness?



- How can we best serve people experiencing homelessness?
- How can we transition people from homelessness to permanent housing quickly and effectively?
