## PET LICENSE FEES



People experiencing homelessness are exempt from paying Orange County license fees for cats and dogs

## TEMPORARY SHELTER OR CARE FOR ANIMALS



Help with locating short or longer term care for pets when people go into homeless shelters (for one night or for longer term), domestic violence services, substance use treatment, or other residential care

## ROUTINE VET CARE



Connections to participating vets who may provide no/low cost animal exams, treatment, flea and tick medication, vaccines

Connections to participating vets and/or funding that may provide urgent animal treatment for grave injuries or trauma like broken bones, infections, and other life-threatening conditions

# Know Your Rights:

## Service and Assistance Animals

Not all companion animals are the same – there are pets, service animals, and assistance animals. Many people experiencing housing crises have service or assistance animals, not pets. This page is an overview of the rights and protections afforded to service and assistance animals.

**It is not legal to ask people if they have a disability. Potential landlords are legally only allowed to ask these two questions about service animals:**

- Is that animal required for a disability?
- What task/work has the animal been trained to do?

**For both service and assistance animals:**

- Breed/size restrictions do not apply
- Animal has to be under control of individual, not a risk or challenge to other residents
- Owner responsible for having animal up-to-date on vaccines
- Owner responsible for animal food and cleaning
- Owner cannot be required to pay extra for having animal - pet deposits not applicable

Per the Fair Housing Act, people with disabilities are allowed “reasonable accommodations in rules, policies, practices, or services when such accommodations may be necessary” for people with disabilities “to use and enjoy a dwelling unit, including public and common use areas.”

If needed, potential residents or their advocates can request reasonable accommodations for assistance animals. During this process, landlords are allowed to ask for proof of disability (if this is not visible) and why the person needs the animal for that specific disability.
